#### **Course Description**:

RUSS 101 is a beginning language course focusing on the study of Russian language and culture. Students begin to develop the ability to communicate in Russian through the consideration of cultural themes, language functions and authentic situations as they acquire the structures and lexicon to work with written language, conversation, and composition. No prior knowledge of Russian is required. In class work is supplemented by 20 hours of online homework. Three hours each week. Formerly RU 101 3 semester hours.

#### **Course Outcomes:**

Upon course completion, students will be able to:

- 1. Communicate in the target language at an elementary level in the skill areas of reading, writing, speaking, and listening.
- 2. Apply linguistic structures supporting communication at the elementary level of proficiency.
- 3. Exhibit elementary proficiency in the production and recognition of the Cyrillic alphabet.

- 4. Express and appropriately employ the following language functions: greetings, leave-takings, requesting information, asking for assistance, giving and receiving directions, and expressing opinions.
- 5. Discuss Russian culture and specific cultural practices at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- 6. Discuss the relationship between the cultural practices and products under consideration at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- 7. Exhibit appropriate sociolinguistic behaviors through oral presentations at the elementary level as these correspond to increasing linguistic ability in Russian.
- 8. Produce and present a cultural project at the elementary level.

## Assignments:

**Tests/Quizzes:** You will have 5-6 written tests/10-12 quizzes during the semester. These tests will consist of the following sections: listening comprehension, vocabulary, grammar, reading, culture and writing. The dates of the tests are stated in the syllabus. Tests and OPI will be taken at the end of each unit. Quizzes will be almost at every session in-class. If a student missed a test for a legal reason, he/she should resolve it in one week. Late test is less 10%.

**Homework &** *MyRussianLab* Assignments: Most of your homework will be done in the online Manual through *MyRussianLab*, an electronic version of the Student Activities Manual. Your instructor will specify which assignments to do on *MyRussianLab*. Due dates for each chapter are listed in the class schedule and on *MyRussianLab*. It is assumed that students will work at least two hours outside of class for each hour in class. Late homework is less 10%.

**Cultural Project:** Students will complete a project that deals with an aspect of Russian culture. The presentation will be 4-5 minutes in length and students will present in Russian. The topic for the project must be approved by the professor by the date indicated in the syllabus. Topics will require research; students will need to use reliable resources and provide a bibliography of their sources following MLA formatting. Students will present their work through the use of technology, such as PowerPoint or Prezi. No more than one 30 second video clip may be used. Students are responsible for presenting their work to the class on the day indicated in the syllabus. More detailed instructions will be provided by your instructor.

**Oral Exams:** Students will complete two oral exams (one at midterm and one at the end of the course) requiring them to speak extemporaneously about a given topic. You will receive a list of topics and a rubric for evaluation 2 weeks prior to each exam. You will have a midterm OPI (oral proficiency interview) on the date stated in the syllabus. The midterm OPI will be a comprehensive review of what you have learned in Chapters 1 through 3. The final OPI will be a comprehensive review of what you have learned during the semester.

**Final Exam:** A cumulative final exam will be given on the day scheduled during the exam period. The final exam is mandatory and cannot be rescheduled. The date for the final exam is indicated in the class schedule. Please mark it on your calendars now.
