





CO-LISTED CLASSES

Some of our classes are co-listed with credit classes. The two sections meet together, and students are held to the same expectations. The only differences are that non-credit students do not have to apply to the college, do not receive a final grade, and seniors can sign up at any time and receive a waiver. Co-listed classes usually have a small number of seats (2-5), so sign up before it's too late!

AGE LIMIT: All classes are for students age 16 and older. We occasionally make exceptions for 14-15-year olds; please contact us for more information.

TUITION WAIVER: Marylanders 60 and older are eligible to pay fees only.

TYPES OF CLASSES OFFERED THIS SEMESTER:

[campus name]: The class meets on campus in its entirety or with self-paced content (noted in section notes).

Distance Learning: The entire class is self-paced. Students will work with resources provided by the instructor with access to instructor guidance, but will not meet with the rest of the class as a group. Students may interact with one another via discussion board, email, or other means.

Structured Remote: The class meets as a group through a videoconferencing tool like Zoom. Some sections meet this way for the whole class period, while others have a shortened class period supplemented by self-paced content. See section notes for details.

DRAWING & ILLUSTRATION

Drawing: Introduction

Begin your journey as an artist or improve the foundations of your current practice. Drawing is at the core of arts disciplines from graphic design to sculpture and everything in between. Learn fundamental drawing skills such as gesture, proportion, composition, cross contour, line, and perspective. Working from direct observation with still life, learn to translate three-dimensional space to a two-dimensional image. Explore various media, including graphite, pens, and ink. Leave class able to communicate observations and ideas visually with drawing media. Note: on-campus sections of this course are taught in a studio with easels and stools. No prior drawing experience necessary.

Pen & Ink Drawing Basics

Explore the expressiveness of ink as a drawing medium. The permanence of the inked mark encourages both decisiveness and experimentation and is a completely different experience than drawing in erasable media! Engage with a medium employed by artists from DaVinci to Ralph Steadman to Katsushika Hokusai, using both observation and imagination for inspiration. Draw using felt-tip pens, dip pens, and brushes for different effects. Practice the visual communication methods of the ink artist, like line weight, hatching and cross-hatching, and ink washes. Open to students of all levels.

Building Complex Structure with Basic Shapes

Construct complex, dynamic drawings by mastering the use of fundamental shapes. Perfect for beginners and enthusiasts alike, this class will help hone your drawing skills. Join us to transform simple shapes into captivating drawings.

NEW! Charcoal Exploration & Still Life

Discover the variety of charcoals available and their application. Practice using vine charcoal, different grades of compressed charcoal, and blending tools. Create a drawing of a still life.

Coffee Painting Still Life

Engage with alternative media by creating watercolor paintings with coffee! Learn setup, mixing, and application techniques to take full advantage of this medium. Explore the range of sepia tones available and how to work with coffee painting's unique texture and finish.

Colored Pencil Landscape

Explore the use of colored pencils, including drawing methods and blending colors. We will draw from landscape photographs this week, so please bring one.

NEW! Composition Basics

Learn the basics of creating balanced, visually engaging compositions. Move through the process step by step starting with tips for setting up a successful still life. Use a view finder and practice strategies for planning and composing a fun, food-themed still life. You may choose to work in pencil or charcoal.

Drawing Basics

Learn basic drawing techniques using graded drawing pencils or charcoal (see section notes). You will focus on drawing from a still life. This workshop is geared toward optimizing use of materials.

Drawing Gymnastics

Engage in drawing exercises designed to improve your observational skills and coordination. Try drawing a still life with a single line. Draw with both hands simultaneously. Draw as fast as you can and then draw even faster! This workshop emphasizes process and experimentation, so please leave your erasers at home! Jazz music will be played during the workshop to set the mood for experimentation and improvisation.

Drawing Texture

Are you frustrated by limp hair in your portraits or stumped by tree bark in your landscapes? Start a visual journal of textures to guide you in your next drawing endeavor. Create life-like textures through mark-making, value patterns, and rubbings. Bring a sketchbook and your texture quandaries to the class!

Exploring Charcoals & Drawing the Hand

Learn to draw hands, one of the most difficult parts of the body to depict! Discover the variety of charcoals available and their application. Practice using vine charcoal, different grades of compressed charcoal, white charcoal, and blending tools. Create a drawing of a hand holding an object.

Ink Still Life

Draw from observation using ink (nibs and/or ballpoint and fountain pens) and learn hatching and cross-hatching techniques. We will continue to work from still life objects.

Pastel Still Life

Delve into the world of pastel with this still life drawing class. Discover the unique charm of pastels as you learn to breathe life into everyday objects. From vibrant fruits to delicate flowers, this course will guide you in capturing the subtle nuances of color and texture.

Portraiture in Conté

Learn the basics of portrait drawing using Conté crayons. Available in black, white, and shades of brown, Conté is made of natural pigments mixed with clay. As a stable medium for use on canvas, rough paper, and colored paper, Conté is equally useful in underdrawing for paintings, sketching, and finished works. Take advantage of the multiple earth tones of Conté to create a finished portrait based on a photograph. Please bring a photograph of a person to class.

Self-Portrait in Multiple Media

Discover tools and techniques for drawing the portrait, including pencil and graphite, colored pencil, watercolor, and wet technique pastel. This week, we will explore self-portraiture from a photograph, so please bring a photograph

Watercolor Pencil & Graphite Still Life

Learn basic drawing techniques combining the use of watercolor pencils and graphite, drawing from a still life.

It's also non-toxic and cleans up with water! Learn how to use a wide variety of acrylic products, including paint, gels, medium, and grounds. Practice mixing clean colors, controlling drying time, and creating glazes and textures. This course is designed for new artists and those who have never explored acrylics in depth.

Learn to produce digital negatives, coat paper, expose, and develop your cyanotypes. Using plant-based chemistry, tone cyanotypes to alter the color of the prints. Finish class with a set of unique cyanotype prints. Please bring 3-5 high resolution (3.5 MB+) digital images to the first class to start your digital negatives. 

A lot of craftsmanship and design went into this first bag I ever made. The Sewing 3 bagmaking project with Wanjin Kim focused on learning how to sew a zipper into a bag, but I learned so much more than that.

This class inspired me to design a bag to serve all my needs when I travel and that's where the complexity came in. It's a big bag that can serve as an overnight bag, a weekender, and even a carry-on bag. Three deep outside pockets allow you to slip in items for easy but safe access. The zippered pockets inside and out will keep your car keys or wallet from falling out. The bag is supported by webbed straps that run nearly the whole length and the base is reinforced by vinyl material, which also adds flair to its design. It's big and sturdy enough to hold a laptop along with your personal items and clothing. Of course, as a boater, I added some nautical accents, left-over anchor embroidery patches from my apron project. I believe the color scheme, the leather label and the small leather touch on the zipper pull led my classmates to call it a "Ralph Lauren" bag.

Tuition Waiver

Courses with a reduced cost listed for MD seniors 60+ are eligible for a tuition waiver. Only tuition is waived; required fees must be paid by the student. Documents must be received at time of registration.

Senior Tuition Waiver: Individuals 60 years or older by the start date of the class may have tuition waived.

Disability Tuition Waiver: Please go to montgomerycollege.edu/wdce/ register/disabilitywaiver.html for information.

National Guard Tuition Waiver: If you are currently a member of the Maryland National guard and are enlisted for at least a 24-month period, you are eligible for a 50 percent tuition waiver. You must submit proof of such from the adjutant general's office.

Residency Policy

The following are general guidelines taken from the College policy on residency for tuition purposes. A complete copy of the policy is available in the Montgomery College Catalog.

- A. Students attending Montgomery College will pay tuition according to their residency.
- B. To qualify, for tuition purposes, as a resident of the state of Maryland, legal domicile must have been maintained for a period of not less than three months prior to the first regularly scheduled class for the semester; unless you are a member of the Military covered under HB935.
- C. The domicile of a person registering in a noncredit course at Montgomery College shall be considered as a person's permanent place of abode, where physical presence and possessions are maintained, and where he/she intends to remain indefinitely.

Transfer Policy

To transfer from one CRN to another CRN of the same course, a letter must be received in the Admissions, Records, and Registration Office, Montgomery College, 51 Mannakee Street, Rockville, MD 20850 before the beginning date of both CRNs of the course. If you have enrolled in a co-listed course you will have only one day after the class has begun to transfer. After that, you are committed to your path for the remainder of the course. If the course has a required assessment level to be a credit student, you must first complete the assessment testing and meet the appropriate assessment level before you can change to credit status.

Refund Policy

Refunds are paid at 100% for classes cancelled, dropped online, or in person (using a Drop Form), prior to the start date of the class. Refunds are also paid at 100% if class is dropped prior to the Refund Date printed on your registration confirmation. DO NOT drop classes online on or after the day the class begins; you will not receive a refund. Refunds for open enrollment classes will go to the registered student of record. 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
